

# LG groups voice some concerns about boat wash station projects

Following up on last week's interview with Lake George Park Commission executive director Dave Wick about the Commission's new boat washing station, The Chronicle sought the views of some of the other interested parties on Lake George. The Commission is now operating the boat washing station on a free and voluntary trial basis at the town boat launch in Hague as part of efforts to prevent invasive species from getting into the lake. Phil Farbaniec, board president of the not-for-profit Norowal Marina in Bolton, said it's not accurate that the board rejected the Park Commission's proposal to locate the boat washing station at Norowal. "For whatever reason, I don't think it ever got out of committee...I think the communications broke down, and we certainly would be happy to reestablish those communications with Dave [Wick]," Mr. Farbaniec said. "I would welcome the opportunity to have him sit down with our board." Mr. Wick said last week he hoped the washing station could be moved to Norowal in August, as well as spend time at the Mossy Point boat launch.

#### Norowal's concern: Liability

Mr. Farbaniec said Norowal's main concern is liability, as to whether the washing, using hot water, could damage the paint or engine impellers of boats if done improperly. Mr. Farbaniec added that Norowal policy gives the marina's management the authority to deny launching to any boat that they feel is contaminated by invasives. Bill Kendall, president of the Lake George Fishing Alliance, said, "We're okay with boat washing, we're okay with doing whatever has to be done, more or less, to keep the invasive species out of Lake George or being transported from one lake to another, [but] we're really against restricted access." Mr. Kendall pointed out that there are some 49 invasive species in Lake Champlain and more in the Hudson River, some for many years, but only four invasives in Lake George. He maintained that this indicates anglers are already doing a good job of cleaning their boats before launching in Lake George.

#### Fisherman's issue: After-hours access

Mr. Kendall said the Alliance, which he said has about 50 dues-paying members, is concerned because "there's been conversation of not permitting boats to enter the lake except when there's somebody to inspect the boat," and possibly locking the gates to ramps when there is no inspector. "That's a great concern to fishermen," some of whom fish year-round, at all hours, he said. Lake stewards won't be at ramps to inspect boats in the middle of the night or at 4 or 5 a.m., when some fishermen go out, he said. Hopefully, said Mr. Kendall, it won't come to that, but "I don't know that they've thought it through completely." He

said there has been some discussion with the Park Commission about following the lead of some states by instituting an angler certification program in which boaters could take an educational course about cleaning invasives off their boats and agree to follow the procedures, and then be exempt from inspection requirements. "That would be fine," but it doesn't solve the after-hours access problem if the gates are locked, Mr. Kendall said. "There's things to be discussed on that." He also expressed concerns about the cost of boat washing stations, which he said runs about \$200,000-\$250,000 each. Contacted for comment, Mr. Wick said that's the price range for the permanent stations out at Lake Tahoe. He said the temporary wash station the Park Commission is using costs \$20,000-\$25,000. Mr. Wick said the Commission was interviewing two consultant firms on Wednesday for the job of developing an invasive species strategic plan for Lake George over the next six months. Citing the cost of permanent wash stations, the Fishing Alliance's Mr. Kendall asks, "Who's going to pay for that? Is it going to be on the back of the angler, the sportsman?" He noted that fishing and hunting license fees support many wildlife conservation programs. The Alliance is involved in stocking salmon in the lake, and would lobby against stocking if access to the lake is restricted, Mr. Kendall said. "If we can't get access to it, we don't want our money spent to stock."

#### **Squadron: Encompass all views**

Armand Canestraro, executive officer of the Lake George Power Squadron boating organization, said, "As to the issue of 'boat washing stations' there clearly will be a need for more than the one wash site....These stations will need to be widespread at public and private boat launch sites along with educational materials as to why they are important." Mr. Canestraro said the Squadron "certainly supports the effort of the Warren County Board of Supervisors and, for that matter, any organization which promotes banning the introduction of invasive species into the pristine waters of Lake George." However, he said, "Additional restrictions being imposed will not be the solution....Education is the key to any program's success." Mr. Canestraro said the Squadron's primary concern, as an active leader in boater education, "is focused on the lack of boater education when it comes to invasive species and how not to aid in their spread." "The viewpoints of everyone involved, property owners, transient pleasure boaters and sportsmen who utilize this tremendous natural resource" need to be taken into consideration, Mr. Canestraro said.

#### How About That Moon!

#### A Brief Explanation of the Moon Phases

The phases of the moon are caused by the relative positions of the earth, sun, and moon. The moon goes around the earth in 27.3 days, or 27 days 7 hours 43 minutes, on average. This measurement is relative to the stars and is called the sidereal period or orbital period. However, because of the earth's motion around the sun, a complete moon cycle (New Moon to New Moon) appears to earthbound observers to take a couple of days longer: 29.5305882 days to be exact. This number is called the synodic period or "lunation", and is relative to the sun.

The sun always illuminates the half of the moon facing the sun (except during lunar eclipses, when the moon passes through the earth's shadow). When the sun and moon are on opposite sides of the earth, the moon appears "full" to us, a bright, round disk. When the moon is between the earth and the sun, it appears dark, a "new" moon. In between, the moon's illuminated surface appears to grow (wax) to full, then decreases (wanes) to the next new moon. The edge of the shadow (the terminator) is always curved, being an oblique view of a circle, giving the moon its familiar crescent shape.
